Centennial celebrations

This year the TOS celebrated the centenary of its founding in February 1908 with events around the theosophical world and all kinds of commemorative publications: bulletins, bookmarks, cards, pens, etc.

A centenary logo was produced by the TOS in Brazil and widely used on letterheads, posters, newsletters and on the T-shirts produced by the TOS in Chennai.

A special edition of *The Service Link* of 90 pages was brought out. The TOS in the Philippines prepared a centennial banner and shipped a copy gratis to groups overseas, along with a large colour poster about the TOS's founder, Dr Annie Besant, and another one on its current operations. At the international TOS's

request, it also produced in DVD form an outstanding illustrated lecture given by Vicente Hao Chin Jnr entitled 'On root causes and symptoms'.

In early March, the TOS and TS in New Zealand collaborated in a weekend programme celebrating the TOS centenary under the title *Joy & the Spiritual Life*. Overseas guests included the Hon. Sec. and Treasurer of the TOS in Pakistan, Fareeda and Aman Amir, Australian TOS member, Dorothy Bell, the National President of the TOS in France, Michel Chapotin and the TOS International Secretary. Time was taken on the second day to celebrate the centenary of a sister organisation called the Round Table, a ceremonial movement for children designed to inculcate spiritual values.

Kenya marked the centenary of the TOS with a stamp. The TOS Centennial special postage stamp was officially launched by the Minister for Gender and Children's Affairs, Hon. Esther Murugi, M.P. on Monday, 17th November 2008. Among other invited guests who attended this function was the Postmaster General, Mr Fred Odhiambo. In the news – His Holiness The Dalai Lama speaks out about bull-fighting

To Whom it May Concern

Today, together with a growing appreciation of the importance of human rights there is a greater awareness worldwide of the need for the protection not only of the environment, but also of animals and their rights. Unfortunately, there continue to be those who feel it is not only acceptable, but also a pleasure, to hunt or fight with animals, resulting in the painful deaths of those animals. This seems to contradict the general spirit of egalitarianism growing in most societies today.

I deeply believe that human beings are basically gentle by nature and I feel that we should not only maintain gentle and peaceful relations with our fellow human beings but that it is also very important to extend the same kind of attitude towards the environment and the animals who naturally live in harmony with it. As a boy studying Buddhism in Tibet, I was taught the importance of a caring attitude towards others. Such a practice of non-violence applies to all sentient beings — any living thing that has a mind. Where there is a mind, there are feelings such as pain, pleasure and joy. No sentient beings want pain, instead all want happiness. Since we all share these feelings at some basic level, we as rational human beings have an obligation to contribute in whatever way we can to the happiness of other species and try our best to relieve their fears and sufferings.

Therefore, I am happy to support the Comité Radicalement Anti-Corrida (CRAC) which is campaigning to prevent bullfighting.

What Breda likes about the TOS work is the genuinely friendly cooperation amongst the TOS representatives of the TS branches. Working with them is a real joy. When there is unity, there is nothing that can't be tackled, Breda feels! Important features of the work for her are this brotherly cooperation and a spontaneous sense of duty to help others whenever it is within one's power to assist – without a self-conscious sense of being a 'helper'. When one is really open, really eager to help, then the work itself will appear. There is no need to search for it, Breda believes.

TOS in Singapore

Danny Giron, the TOS Coordinator for Singapore, writes about the service activities that this new TOS group is energetically implementing:

The group's first long term project involves regular visits to the Bright Hill Evergreen Home for elderly people. About eight to ten TOS members regularly meet at the Home on Wednesday evenings after work. Through the unfailing devotion of sister Nancy, they provide muffins, cookies and other snacks for the residents. Those residents who are able to go to the recreation room in a wheelchair or with assisted walking are entertained with songs by popular Chinese entertainers on DVD.

Another activity to benefit the elderly was made possible by the generosity of TOS member, brother Kay Keng Chuan, who donated time and money to provide a sumptuous Chinese

vegetarian lunch for the 183 residents of Tai Pei Old People's Home. They were joined by TOS and other TS members for the occasion.

To keep conversations buzzing around stimulating topics, the Singapore TOS members have established an e-group.

In addition to their TOS group activities, some members have been involved in personal service projects. While these projects are not officially TOS activities, they are done in the spirit of philanthropy. Brother Choong Chi Pin has been giving free tai chi lessons for several years. Others have been volunteers in various community service programs and Danny is planning to start an environmental awareness program with nature walks and group assistance with environmental clean-up activities.

Renee Sell, National Coordinator of the TOS in New Zealand, shares the highlights of a busy year.

One of the special fundraising projects for the 2008 Centenary was the creation of the Geoffrey Hodson Trust Fund which now has two parts to it:

- a Scholarship Fund for the Golden Link School in the Philippines to create an ongoing scholarship for one child at the school; and
- a fund to help keep in print the inspiring books that Geoffrey Hodson wrote.

Another special project was to secure five more child sponsorships in India from New Zealand.

The TOS has continued its work in the area of education in Pakistan where the TOS sponsors a literacy home-school and the National Council of the TS also sponsors a school. The individual child sponsorships from New Zealand continue and are coordinated by Vicki Jerome.

The TOS in New Zealand maintains strong links with

Summary of the International TOS Plan of Action: 2008-2013

This plan of action has been developed through extensive international consultation with members to guide the work of the International TOS during the next five years. It will periodically be reviewed and amended during its lifespan. The work will be carried out by international teams of volunteers.

In summary, the plan proposes action in eight main areas:

1. Development of International TOS constitutional guidelines

These guidelines will outline the TOS's foundations, purpose, structure, membership and relationship to the Theosophical Society. They are expected to be available in 2009, after consultation with and approval by the International President.

2. Staffing International Secretariat

It is felt that a team is needed at international level to support the management of the TOS and the expansion of its work. Volunteers will be sought for particular roles such as assistant secretary, assistant editor of publications and translation coordinator.

3. Increasing awareness of the TOS's existence

The TOS is currently present in only half the countries where the TS is active. Much needs to be done to make Theosophists aware of the opportunity to participate in the TOS's work and to start groups. As a first step, it is proposed to produce an introductory pamphlet 'What is the TOS?' and update the start-up kit for new TOS groups.

4. Development of international TOS publications

In addition to the international magazine, *The Service Link*, several other communication strategies will be put in place: an international website, an international e-newsletter and a team of volunteer translators, particularly for languages within India.

5. Increasing awareness of the nature of the TOS's work

The main purpose of the TOS is to encourage members to take up the path of service to humanity and the planet. Its mission is to offer:

- a framework in which individuals may work in self-selected lines of service for the relief of suffering and the uplifting of society;
- a framework in which the practical application of theosophical principles to issues of contemporary concern may be explored;
- a framework in which social action as spiritual practice is honoured, supported and nurtured.

A group of volunteers will explore strategies and draft useful material to improve understanding about the nature and function of the TOS.

6. Development of support materials for different lines of service

Volunteers will be invited to develop programmes and resource materials on which local and national TOS leaders can draw in their work of facilitating service within the TOS, within the TS and by individual Theosophists.

7. Skills development programmes

Again, volunteers will be invited to develop 'how-to' materials and workshop plans in two areas: to enhance the operation of their group and to support the inner transformational process involved in theosophical service.

8. Development of financial management policy and procedures

Some of the areas proposed for attention are:

- · accountability processes about how funds donated from other countries are used and reported on;
- · clear procedures for the channelling of funds for emergency relief;
- ways of transmitting money internationally (such as PayPal).



UN International Days from December 2008 to March 2009

December 1: U.N. World AIDS Day (Media Resources). The World AIDS Campaign has announced the theme of 'Leadership' under the banner of "Stop AIDS. Keep the Promise."

December 2: International Day for the Abolition of Slavery

December 3: International Day of Disabled Persons 2008 Theme: 'Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities: Dignity and justice for all of us'. Around 10 per cent of the world's population, or 650 million people, live with a disability. They are the world's largest minority. The World Bank estimates that 20 per cent of the world's poorest people have some kind of disability, and tend to be regarded in their own communities as the most disadvantaged.

December 5: International Volunteer Day for Economic and Social Development

December 9: International Anti-Corruption Day

December 10: Human Rights Day Theme for 2008, 'Dignity and justice for all of us'.

December 18: International Migrants Day

World Tuberculosis Day is designed to build public awareness about the disease. It commemorates the day in 1882 when Dr Robert Koch announced that he had discovered the cause of tuberculosis (TB). His discovery opened the way toward diagnosing and curing tuberculosis. Tuberculosis kills about two million people each year, making it one of the world's leading infectious causes of death among young people and adults. One-third of the world's population is infected with TB.
